1960s

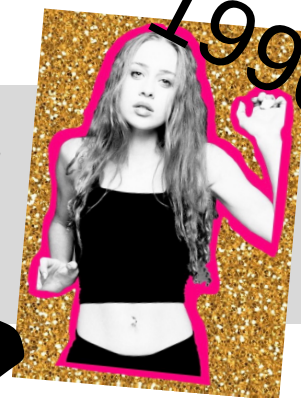


1980s

Cindy Crawford, a Super Model, shows off this era's ideal of the perfect female body: athletic and curvy.

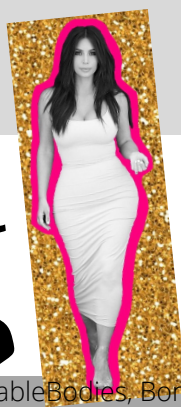


1990s
